The Council is clear why it grants the two different types of tenancies it does; this is about protecting the Council from lengthy litigation and effectively managing tenancies.

It is important to the Council that where the protected characteristic may affect the likelihood of tenancy sustainment, for example, disability and poor mental health, that effective tenancy support, and support from partner agencies is put in place to increase the chance of the tenancy being successful.

<p><b>3.1 What is the reason for the proposed decision/change?</b></p>	<p>The Council's Tenancy Management Policy uses introductory tenancies to help provide support for the first year of the tenancy. These will in the main be granted to people who haven't previously held a tenancy, and those where the tenancy is at a higher risk of tenancy failure.</p>
<p><b>3.2 What consultation activity has been undertaken or is planned?</b></p>	<p>The Council plans to consult with tenants and leaseholders on this Policy once the work the Council is doing with the Tenant Participation and Advisory Service has been finalised and the Council has a formal structure for engagement.</p>
<p><b>3.3 Service Users – What methods are used to monitor the characteristics of service-users with protected characteristics?</b></p>	<p>The Council holds information regarding the protected characteristics of its tenants and leaseholders.</p>
<p><b>3.4 Referring to Stage 2, which 'protected characteristic' group(s) are most likely to be affected by this change? Describe any negative impacts identified in more detail.</b></p>	<p>Age – young people are more likely to be granted an introductory tenancy, due to the fact they are less likely to have held a tenancy previously.</p> <p>Disability –people with poor mental health are more likely to have challenges in sustaining a general needs tenancy, and are more likely to need more support and intervention from partner agencies.</p> <p>Race - People who do not read English may require communication to be tailored to meet their needs. This will also assist those with low literacy levels.</p>

<p><b>Outline ways in which negative or positive impacts will be addressed?</b></p>	<p>Age - The Council will look at the suitability of a home, for all residents, as part of the initial allocation. The Council will engage with the young person more frequently as part of supporting the introductory tenancy, and the young person will be encouraged to engage with other external partners to help them sustain their tenancy where any tenancy issues are identified.</p> <p>Disability - The Council will look at the suitability of a home, for all residents, as part of the initial allocation. The Council will engage with the person with poor mental health more frequently as part of supporting the introductory tenancy, and the person will be encouraged to engage with other external partners such as Community Mental Health Team (CMHT), health and social services to help them sustain their tenancy, where any tenancy issues are identified.</p> <p>Race - The Council will ensure that all essential communication is translated for any non English reading people. The Council will consider using pictorial tenancy agreements for any tenants with literacy issues.</p>
